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Acknowledgement of Country

Kindred Spirits Enterprises acknowledges the Traditional Owners of the land on which we live, work and play. We pay our respects to their Elders past and present – for they hold the memories, traditions, culture and hopes of their community.

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Ben Tunks Founder and Project Lead The Little Village Project is a community-led initiative auspiced by Kindred Spirited Enterprises (KSE) that supports vulnerable children in the Latrobe Valley. Founded by youth worker and counsellor Ben Tunks in 2019, the project supports primary schools by raising funds to provide timely, evidenced-based interventions to help their disadvantaged students flourish.

In partnership with KSE, the project funded its first intervention at Stockdale Road in 2020 and expanded to Grey Street and Tanjil South primary schools in 2023. Kosciuszko Street Primary School became the fourth expansion school in 2024. In four years, the project has supported more than 100 students by offering a range of services, including mental health care, speech and occupational therapy, and sensory support.

These interventions help eliminate barriers that are holding students back from engaging with their education. The communityfunded interventions enable the students to actively participate in classes and other activities, ultimately fostering a brighter and more promising future for each child.

Kindred Spirits Enterprises (KSE) turns ideas into impact. It provides backbone support to individuals and organisations to develop place-based social impact projects that create positive change in their communities.

The not-for-profit took its first steps in 2016 thanks to the founder of Kindred Spirits Foundation, Rhonda Renwick. Rhonda created KSE to work hand-in-hand with regional and remote communities and entrepreneurs to develop sustainable livelihoods and address social challenges.

KSE, along with other key partners, supported First Nations communities in northern Australia to develop social enterprises before helping to develop projects in Gippsland. KSE collaborated with communities to develop education, health and environment focused projects, such as Regen Gippsland, the Kurnai Young Parents Program Mentor Initiative and The Little Village Project.

The challenge

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Before launching The Little Village Project (LVP) at Stockdale Road Primary School, it was clear to the school's Wellbeing Support Officer and LVP founder, Ben Tunks, that essential interventions for vulnerable students, such as assessments, therapeutic and clinical support and allied health services, were financially out of reach for many families. Long waiting lists and complicated healthcare systems further hindered timely access to vital support. Existing programs often imposed rigid guidelines, leaving little room for innovation or tailored solutions.

The vision

In response to these challenges, Ben envisioned the LVP as a safety net, designed to catch students who might otherwise slip through the cracks of existing services. This communityled and funded initiative aimed to empower school staff to better address the complex issues impacting their students and families. Ultimately, LVP focuses on removing barriers hindering students' full participation in education, with a longterm goal of improving academic attainment and fostering healthy and happy students.

The support

Ben's vision garnered support from the Gippsland Regional Executive Forum (GREF), leading to a partnership with Kindred Spirits Enterprises (KSE) in 2019. KSE auspiced the project, offered valuable administrative resources and helped initiate fundraising efforts. Members of GREF helped fund initial student interventions, with KSE actively advocating for the project and establishing lasting partnerships. An advisory group featuring representatives from Gippsland's business community and local allied health professionals was formed in 2019 to guide Ben and review student support requests.

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The partnerships

In early 2023, the project secured long-term partnerships with the Latrobe Health Assembly and AGL Loy Yang, facilitating its expansion to Grey Street and Tanjil South primary schools in 2023, before partnering with Kosciuszko Street Primary School in 2024. INDRED

The project in action

Students are identified for support when their functioning is impacted at school, which shows up in behavioural, attendance and academic data. Students might also be identified as needing assistance through engagement with parents/carers, via the school nurse, the Department of Education and Training Student Support Services team, community-based service providers or observations from their teacher and education support staff.

Interventions are sourced and discussed with the student, their family and others who might help the student and their family overcome the challenges impacting on their ability to engage at school.

The Little Village Project (LVP) is purposefully broad so that it can cover the specific needs of the children it supports.

Low and no-cost alternatives are always investigated and the LVP is usually only ever accessed when no other options are available, or if these alternative options cannot be delivered in a timely manner. The LVP leverages from the close relationships that the school and school staff have with their families and builds upon one of the greatest strengths that this community has, which is getting their children to primary school.

The participating school, via its Wellbeing Support Officer or equivalent, submits expenditure requests to the LVP Advisory Group, who then provide the go-ahead for the interventions, or follow up with further questions.

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Education crisis

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While all across Australia, schools and communities are in the midst of an education crisis, Latrobe Valley also has region specific issues to address.

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The Little Village Project is working closely with primary schools and partner organisations to explore innovative solutions to many of the challenges encountered in our Latrobe Valley primary schools.

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"Many students with disabilities in the Latrobe Valley schools lack access to crucial support," Ms Feldt said.


> Estimates show that chronic absenteeism levels in schools reached 49.9 per cent in 2022, with between one per cent to five per cent of all students classed as severely absent.

Ms Feldt said the school was not fortunate enough to have the funding to hire an on-ground speech pathologist, and said the supply for specialists was not here in the Latrobe Valley.


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




The Little Village Project has helped **116** children thrive across **four** primary schools in the Latrobe Valley.

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






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Changing lives

School camp - An alternative choice

Kate is a nine-year-old student at one of our partner schools. She lives in foster care and has experienced a traumatic start to life. School is challenging for her because her body has become accustomed to being in fight or flight mode given the adversity she has survived.

She has managed to find safety and security at home and at school, where she is surrounded by nurturing and attuned caregiving, but the symptoms of her trauma are evident in her lingering unpredictable and distressing behaviour.

Kate's foster carer and her school desperately want her to undertake all the quintessential experiences that go hand-in-hand with attending primary school; however, it has become evident that taking Kate on school camp would present too much of a risk to her safety.

With the funding available via The Little Village Project, the school and Kate's foster carer were able to find an alternative camp that caters specifically to children with backgrounds similar to Kate's. The hope is that as Kate's trauma continues to heal and her behaviour becomes safer and more predictable, she will gain transferrable skills from the alternative camp that will allow her to join her friends on school camp next year.





The Education Support Worker with a heart of gold

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Renee is an Education Support Worker at one of our partner schools. She has an absolute heart of gold and the kids at her school adore her for her ability to nurture them, guide them, pick them up when they fall and advocate for their best interests.

Likewise, the parents at the school are happy to know that their children have someone at the school who they can trust to provide such genuine care for their kids.

It's through this amazing work that Renee was having a conversation with a parent who was lamenting that they could not afford the occupational therapy that their child needed and would therefore have to go without. Renee quickly recalled The Little Village Project and suggested that the school could make an application to have this cost completely covered.

The Little Village Project wishes to thank the likes of Renee for being the conduit to which the money we raise is directed to where it is needed most.





Changing lives

Speech therapy - A cost effective solution

Mark is the Disability Inclusion Leader at one of our partner schools. He noticed that many children within his school were having difficulty with their speech and language, to the point whereby it was impacting on their ability to engage in learning. Learning to read, write and spell can be incredibly difficult for a five-year-old when you can't yet articulate /th/, /sh/ and other sounds!

He reached out to a local speech therapist and despite her books being closed, convinced her to attend his school once per week for several hours to work with his students and staff using funding from The Little Village Project.

Mark has told us that the 20 students directly involved in the project have shown amazing growth, but perhaps the most remarkable secondary outcome has been the upskilling of Mark's colleagues and the knowledge they have gained from working so closely with a qualified speech therapist.













The Latrobe Health Assembly, AGL Loy Yang and Kindred Spirits Foundation have so far collectively contributed \$189,000 and committed an additional \$202,478 to the Little Village Project.
